

PROTESTS DEPORTATION OF RADICAL AGITATOR

Jessica C. L. Henderson
Cites Doctor's Report Edith
Berkman Very Ill

Boston, Aug. 25—(AP)—Protest against the deportation of Edith Berkman, radical labor agitator, was urged today in a statement by Jessica C. L. Henderson for the New England branch of the national committee for the defense of political prisoners.

The statement said that Dr John B. Hawes, 26, of Boston, tuberculosis specialist, examined Miss Berkman today at the central New England sanitarium at Rutland and found her seriously ill. It quoted Dr Hawes as saying she was suffering from complications that would wear the strongest person out and that she was in no condition to be moved.

"In view of this eminent opinion," the statement said, "the alarming report that Edith Berkman is to be immediately deported to Poland where she faces imprisonment, should be met

at once with the strongest protest, not only from her friends and sympathizers but from all who want to put a stop to the outrageous persecution of political prisoners."

Miss Berkman was arrested during a textile strike at Lawrence in 1931 and subsequently was ordered deported to Poland after a hearing before federal immigration authorities. For several weeks she has been ill with tuberculosis at the Rutland sanitarium.
