FINAL APPEAL ON VACCINATION

Case of Jacobson Against Commonwealth Argued Before Federal Supreme Court by G. F. Williams and F. H. Nash.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6, 1904. Arguments were made today in the United States supreme court in the case of Henning Jacobson, plaintiff in error, against the commonwealth of Massachusetts. The arguments proved extremely interesting and were heard by all the members of the court and a large audience. The arguments for the commonwealth were made by Asst. Atty.-Gen. Nash, and George Fred Williams stated the case for the plaintiff.

This test case of the Massachusetts Anti-Compulsory Vaccination Society was brought to the United States supreme court from the supreme court of the commonwealth, the opinion of which court was that the compulsory vaccination law was constitutional.

The attorney for the plaintiff today insisted that the law is in violation of the federal constitution. Atty. Williams was closely questioned by several members of the court, indicating that they are interested in the case. This case is of considerable importance to other states where compulsory vaccination laws are now in force.

Jessica C. Henderson of Boston, president of the Massachusetts Anti-Compulsory Vaccination Association, and Mrs. Caroline Hanks Hitchcock of Cambridge came to Washington especially to hear the arguments today.
